This resource will help you to navigate through specific patient situations which may during the transition to the new guidelines. These include:

- Transitioning patients on 1 or 2 year screening to 3 year interval screening
- Transitioning patients in abnormal result follow-up
- Transitioning patients 24 years and under

Health-care providers are required to review some patients' screening needs based on the new guidelines. Review this resource to determine which patients you need to review, and to find abnormal result follow-up pathways through these transition points.
